## **Emissions Recertification Expiration Change**

## **Failure to Satisfy Emissions Fines**

Please be advised, the Vehicle Equipment and Inspection Regulations Subchapter D, Schedule of Penalties and Suspension, was updated in October of 2013 and now includes the following violation:

*Failure to satisfy monetary penalties for violations of Chapter 177* (relating to the emission inspection program) within 90 days of notification will now result in a suspension of your safety inspection certification.

Emission fines that remain unpaid will result in progressive suspension action: suspension until the amount due is paid for the first offense; a 2-month suspension or until amount due is paid, whichever is *greater*, for the second offense; or a 6-month suspension or until amount due is paid, whichever is greater, for a third offense.

In the event you operate as a safety and emission inspection station, and you have an unpaid emission fine, until that fine is paid, your ability to perform safety inspections will also be affected.

## **Emissions Recertification Expiration Change**

Please be advised, effective September 1, 2016, emission recertification exams will need to be taken within six months *prior to* expiration. There will be no extension provided beyond the expiration date on your emission credentials. Emission inspectors will need to retest prior to their credential expiring.
